



Data from 9 universities and 6,438 students shows student retention is higher with parent engagement

Executive Summary:

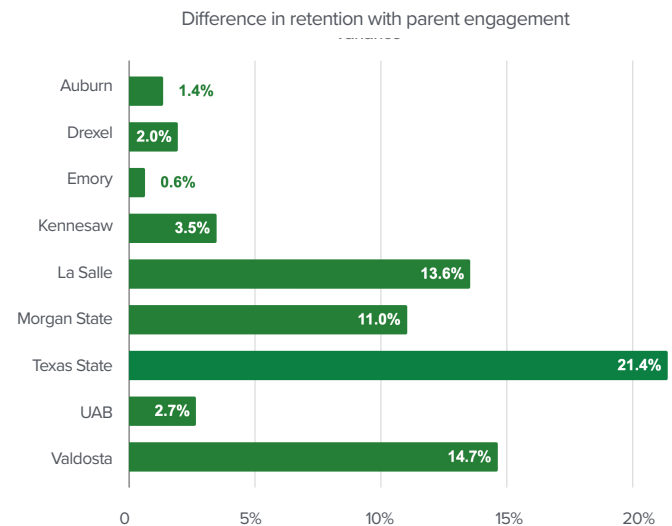
This brief report features findings from an exploratory study of parent engagement and student retention based on 6,438 students enrolled at nine universities in the Fall of 2020. At most schools, the more frequently a parent received academic and financial updates on their student, the more likely the student remained enrolled and made progress toward completing their degree.










+8% On average, student retention was 8% higher for a student when their parent or guardian received regular updates on student progress, compared to students with a parent who did not receive similar updates.

Student retention is higher when parents receive updates on student progress

The data showed that students with parent engagement were between +0.6% and +21.4% more likely to be retained after their first year. The average increase across all institutions was 7.9%. The results were observed across both private and public institutions, as well as schools ranging in size from 3,293 FTE to 37,390 FTE.

For the purpose of this study, "parent engagement" refers to parents or guardians receiving emails on student progress. Emails were sent to parents and guardians when academic or financial data on the students' records changed, such as new holds being placed on student accounts. The alerts contained access to FERPA protected data and provided guidance on how parents could best support their students.

The impact of parent engagement on retention is highest for students of color

Data indicated that the impact of parent engagement was greatest for Black or African American and Hispanic students. At Drexel University, Black students showed a 7.4% increase in retention when their parents received updates on their progress, compared to a 1.1% increase for White students and their families. Similar trends were seen at Texas State University. Hispanic students showed a 26.0% increase in student retention, compared to 20.1% for White students, when their parents were sent regular academic and financial updates.

In previous studies, data has shown that Black families and Hispanic families have higher levels of parent engagement with their students, which may account for the larger increase in student retention that was observed.

Methodology:

Data related to race/ethnicity, institutional retention rates, and parent engagement provided by: **Auburn University, Drexel University, Emory University, Kennesaw State University, La Salle University, Morgan State University, Texas State University, University of Alabama at Birmingham, and Valdosta State University.** Student retention was calculated for all full-time 1st year undergraduate students entering in the Fall 2020 term that returned for the following Fall 2021 term.

Parent engagement consisted of updates sent to parents and guardians on student progress. In order for parents to receive updates, parents were required to create an account in a school-branded CampusESP Parent Portal, initiate an electronic FERPA waiver request for their student's data, and have their student approve the request. Once the FERPA waiver was approved, parents received email updates when their students' academic and financial data changed. Parents were informed of unmet financial aid requirements, new holds, final grade assignments, student status changes (changing from full-time to part-time) and new account charges.



Student retention rates were calculated for students with parents receiving progress updates and compared to each institution's overall student retention rate to determine the average increase in retention. The analysis was repeated using race/ethnicity data for students provided by participating universities.
